The drOp co-governance strategy offers Ermua, and subsequently Matera and Elva, a comprehensive toolkit to facilitate collaborative and impactful interventions in disadvantaged areas. This includes supporting improvements in housing conditions, energy efficiency, and smart renovation initiatives.

The drOp co-governance model is a city-level, institutionally enabled **collaboration** involving multiple stakeholders, structured around a 5P partnership framework.

Target public:

The drOp co-governance model* is tailored for **small peripheral cities**, considering factors like a higher-than-average elderly population and challenges with transportation and logistics.

*The model is city-based, meaning that it can include the entire city and not only the district dimension.

Goals to be achieved:

- Favouring **social cohesion** among local citizens in deprived areas;
- Facilitating **urban regeneration** processes adaptability and coherency with local necessities;
- Enhancing local **civic and political participation**;
- Empowering local organizations' ability to **respond to local needs**;
- Improving **cultural and creative** local production and consumption;
- **Innovating political processes and institutions** in order to make them more accessible;
- Reframing the **local identity**.

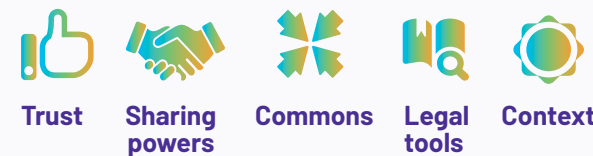
1 The model comprises 3 fundamental pillars, which are the diagnosis, the local task forces, and the granting.
